Held at Skinner Park, San Fernando on Fantastic Friday (February 17), a tearful Ricardo Melville placed first in the 28-year-old competition.


Melville's exhilarating delivery of We are One, his nation-building song which celebrates TT's rich culture and people, got him the first prize of \$400,000. It is a win the artiste said he was expecting since he was "confident in the positivity of the song."

Many are speaking of We are One and the important message that it carries, one that is relevant for this time.

Asked where he got the idea for the song, Melville, who has been performing for over 25 years, said, "The idea came from Lewis Rowan (Tempo). He sent it to me and after listening to it, I made some changes to the lyrics to suit me. Therefore, the song was written by myself and Lewis."

It was produced, arranged and mixed by Rishi Gayadeen of RG the Band and mastered by Nikholia Greene.

Melville's energetic performance was also backed by a stage full of colourfully interesting props. His production included the Arouca Prisons Marching Band, Golden Boys Tassa Group, Sade Ellis Aerial

A lot of hard work and effort went into Melville's performance and production. He rehearsed twice with the band, for the semis and finals, and a number of times by himself, all in preparation for the highly anticipated competition.

Did he encounter any challenges regarding his performance? The artiste insisted that he didn't.

"My manager and wife handled everything. I just focused on my song, ensuring that I rendered it the right way.

Asked who he would like to thank for this win, the CSM champ said, "I have to give God thanks first. I also want to thank my team – Tricia Ramdhanie of Sunset Party Promotions TT,

"Kevin of PDPI Ltd, my wife,

Sangeeta, Abbigail of Premala New Generation Dance Academy, Rishi Gayadeen of RG The Band and all friends, family and fans.

Melville is intent on producing positive and original music. As for what he plans to do with his winnings, he said, "I plan on getting my daughter the best education."

He has vowed to continue in the music industry until death. What keeps him going is believing in himself, his passion for music, hard work and perseverance. He said he aims to have his music "entice people all

year round, race does not matter."

To others in his field he encouraged, "Don't give up!" and to his critics he said, "Thanks for your input. You make me stronger!"

A crossover artiste singing soca, chutney soca, reggae, R&B and soca parang, Melville has accomplished several other wins including the Sangre Grande Soca Monarch in 1993, the Prime Minister's Best Village Trophy (Chutney Soca category) in 2022, three-time winner of the CRC Raja title (2021, 2022, 2023). In 2022, he placed second in the Intellectual Chutney Monarch competition. He placed third in CSM in 2021 and 2022, third in the 100FM's Groovy Soca Sing off in 2022 and fourth in the 103FM's Chutney Soca Road March also in 2022.

Born in Tobago but raised in Trinidad, Melville started singing in school at churches at the age of 13. His professional career started at the age of 18.

How did he get the name Daddy Chinee? "My father being Chinese/East Indian, my relatives started calling me 'Chinee boy' but when I started singing and travelling, I added 'Daddy' because boy could not travel," Melville laughed.

He has performed with bands such as Kaliyan, Trishul, Roy Cape Allstars, Sound Revolution, Jah Vibes, Melobugs, T&TEC Gayatones (now known as the GT Band), Dil-E-Nadan and is the former founder and owner of the band Hipnotic. He is currently a member of the RG Band led by Rishi Gayadeen.



Darius lives and it has certainly come true

Darius has been singing for over 30 years but has only accomplished her first major win this year as she was crowned NWAC Calypso Queen.

Darius' outstanding delivery of the calypso Now More Than Ever got her the prestigious title of Calypso Queen at the 37th edition of the competition which was hosted at Queen's Hall, St Ann's, on January 29 by the National Women's Action Committee (NWAC).

Her exhilarating performance of the calypso composed by Brian London has left many in awe. Darius was dressed in our national colours and went down on her knees calling out to the country and its citizens to stand united during these trying times and work towards a greater TT.

"Trinbago now more than ever, we need to stand together. For more than 60 years we have depended on each other, we need each other more than ever, we need to show we are one nation standing together." Words truly deserving of the hearty applause received.

She said about her success, "Winning the national Calypso Queen title still

feels surreal. I'm extremely happy that all the hard work and sacrifice has finally paid off. It's my first major title and first time in that competition. This title was handed down from my sister and the fact that my son (my biggest supporter and prodigy) was there to witness my victory made it even better." She added that her most rewarding experience was seeing her son, Xhaiden, witnessing her victory and knowing it's a step in the right direction for him. Xhaiden, six, also found calypso success this year, winning the San Fernando junior monarch competition for primary school students.

Coming from a talented family, Darius started singing calypso at the age of five. Her mother wrote calypsoes for her sister who also started singing at a tender age. Ambitious as ever, Darius wanted to follow in her sister's footsteps so she asked her mother to write a calypso for her. "She refused because I had a very heavy/husky talking voice," Darius explained, "but after much hesitation, she eventually penned a calypso called Parents in Distress and I

won my first competition."

In her junior calypso days, Darius's mother continued writing her songs. Over the years though, she has worked with a number of other writers making her debut in the Calypso Revue tent in 2007. That same year, she took the South Calypso Monarch title with a Gregory Ballantyne composition, Through the eyes of a Gangster, and No Interconnection by Larry Harewood. In 2011, she was a finalist in the National Calypso Monarch Competition with Ungrateful by Winsford "Joker" Devine.

She pointed out, Now More Than Ever, the song I won the title with, was written by Brian London and my 2023 hit Susheila's Jahaji Bash was written by Christophe Grant who composed four out of the five songs that took me to the semifinals." She placed fifth in this year's calypso monarch final.

Asked how she selects a theme for her songs, Darius admitted that while she may choose a topic or have input, most times she leaves it up to the writer.

With every success comes its own set of challenges and for Darius it

was no different. She disclosed, "The greatest challenge I faced this year was preparing both my son and myself for the Carnival season as some performances and auditions clashed."

Despite her challenges, displaying qualities of a true queen, Darius made it happen. "I work by appointments so I am able to schedule time for rehearsals for both my son and myself," she pointed out. "I take my singing very seriously so most of my spare time is spent rehearsing because I believe there's always room for improvement."

The singer's family has also been very supportive of her journey. Around this time of year, a few of her family members get together to put things in place for her so she can focus on her stage performance. "I must make mention of my mom, Angela Darius, and my cousin, Adanna, who after seeing me cry for almost half day (because the outfit I had planned to wear in Skinner Park didn't turn out as expected), spent all of the Friday night before the competition, constructing a new outfit which looked excellent on stage. My cousin Leslie too, works in the background to ensure the technical aspect of my performance is always on point," stated Darius.

Asked if she would like to offer any words of advice to those involved in the artform, the Calypso Queen said, "Keep going and let's nurture the youths for they are the ones to carry on our legacy."

aparima Girls' High School and Naparima College students had much to celebrate this Carnival season. Their band – Naps Combined Steel Orchestra returned to winner's row in the secondary schools category of the 2023 National Junior Panorama competition.

They players won with their rousing rendition of Big Bad Soca by Bunji Garlin at the finals, Queen's Park Savannah, Port of Spain on January 22. The arrangement was done by Shaquille Vincent with Desree Seecharan and Kevon Duncan as drill masters.

Roger Ali, the acting principal of Naparima College, said both schools are extremely grateful for the victory since it serves as a reward for the many hours of work put in by the arranger, drill masters, and most importantly, the players.

Band member Joshua Eversley agreed. "It's a new feeling for sure but a welcome one. Even back in primary school I hadn't played for any sort of Panorama event, so it's definitely a new environment for me at least. For my first time competing not just with NAPS Combined, but in Panorama as a whole, it's very amazing to know that I can call myself and the whole band champions."

Another player Daniella Maharaj felt overjoyed. "I am in love with being part of a champion team. We deserved that first place. We worked with conscientiousness and we were meticulous so that we could achieve our goal. And I saw for myself that hard work indeed pays off."

The emotions were similarly felt by Kadeer Mohammed and Aiden Roy Mohammed. "I am overjoyed," said Kadeer. "It feels like it isn't real, I am very proud of my band members and amazed by their talents." Aiden agreed that the title was well-deserved. "We all put out an overwhelming effort, both players and support team alike," he said.

Vincent, who chose Big Bad Soca to arrange for the band, felt it was important to celebrate our culture.

"Everyone's song selection process is different. I always try to choose a piece that was never done for a Panorama before. Big Bad Soca was a song I always liked and I love the message, the praises sung about our culture and soca music, in particular. The lyrical content is also uplifting, so this was a plus."

Naps Combined was conceived by former music teacher of Naparima Girls', Bernadette Roberts. She approached then principal Carolyn Bally-Gosine who bought into the idea. "It was thought that we would not have had enough members from our school," explained acting principal, Karen Bally, "so we decided to invite the boys from our brother school to join us, and the rest is history."

The initial stages were challenging as neither school had the required number of pans but they were fortunate to obtain the support of San Fernando Mayor Junia Regrello and got use of Heritage Skiffle Steel Orchestra's pans.

Additionally, Unipet came on board as a major sponsor of the band. "We have also been very fortunate to have members of staff who understand the importance of activities such as these and who dedicate themselves to seeing it to the end," said Bally who made special mention of Kathy Ann Cedeno-Cook (Naparima Girls') and Amanda Ramjohn (Naparima College) – co-managers who have been with the band from its inception.

There is no doubt that the band encountered challenges in the face of the covid19 pandemic and with students leaving school as they graduated. However, this was

overcome with the recruitment of a new group of prospective players.

"With guidance from those in charge of the music and a lot of hard work and practice that void disappears. This year in particular, we had a surplus of inexperienced players. To combat this, we would have done some rudimentary and technical work before starting to teach the arrangement," said Cedeno-Cook.

As such, training began in October with sessions once a week. By November that increased to twice a week. As the preliminaries and finals approached, training was seven days a week. The players also sacrificed their Christmas vacation as the band put in all-day training sessions.

So what can we expect from Naps Combined in the future? The band hopes to be more than a Panorama band. "We see ourselves in the not too distant future acquiring some pans of our own," said Cedeno-Cook. "We would like to build our band's repertoire so that we can organise a concert to showcase the talents of our young players. Ultimately, we aim to form a stage side that would be able to play at various events."

Although Naps Combined only started in September 2017 and entered the Junior Panorama competition in 2018, its success has been impressive. Its wins include:

2023: 1st - Big Bad Soca by Bunji Garlin

UPTOWN FASCINATORS ARRANGER: NOTHING BEATS WINNING

teelband arranger Ojay Richards still finds it surreal that his band, Tobago's Uptown Fascinators, not only won this year's Panorama small conventional bands crown, but did so for a second time

"It's a surreal feeling because we prepared hard for it. We had the goal of winning but nothing beats that feeling even though you know you're in that position to win the competition," Richards said.

"There is nothing better than hearing the band name

called in the first position," he smiled. "We were very ecstatic about it and I feel really great about taking the title two times in a row."

Uptown Fascinators won in 2020, when Carnival was last held before a two-year hiatus owing to the covid19 pandemic.

The band's energetic performance of Dollar Wine by Colin Lucas won them the 2023 title at the Panorama small bands finals held at Queen's Park Savannah, Port of Spain on January 14. They placed first with 281 points.

The arranger first thanked the band members and the management. for its success. He further added, "I want to thank anybody who believed in me and trusted in me and in my guidance as an arranger. They put their full trust in me, first of all just to arrange the sound and tune of choice and everything, and I could not have done it without that support from the band, the management, the general supporters and the people who would have been holding me down behind the scenes as well."

This is Richards' fifth year arranging for Uptown Fascinators.

"In the first year of me arranging, we made it to the finals for the first time in the band's existence. We then placed fifth in the second year. In the third year, we placed sixth and in the following two years we won consistently."

As for why Dollar Wine was chosen, Richards pointed out, "I like to choose older songs as I think that I could work a lot better with music that comes from the older tunes."

But it isn't just the older tunes that appeal to him. He explained that it must be a hit song that even the old and young can identify with, remember and know.

"When I brought the song to the captain, she just knew that I would have picked a song like that because it fits my style as an arranger," he laughed. His idea for this song dawned on him in a conversation with a colleague from the University of TT who suggested the song would be a good option for Panorama.

"I never really thought about it before," said Richards, "and when I actually listened to it I told him, 'You know what, you're right. I think I'll do that with Uptown,' and that's how it came about."

Early in the season, members of the band rehearsed every day with the exception of weekends. When it got closer to competition time, they practised every night. "On weekends, we practised during the day and on weekdays, we practised at night," said Richards.

Questioned on the challenges, Richards said, "Just getting competent players is a challenge but I don't have a huge problem with Uptown anymore because the band has grown and understands my arrangement and my style."

He disclosed that in the early days it was a bit challenging. "Certain things I know that I might have had to pull back, or put in, or not be able to, because the band may not have been able to take it," said Richards, "but they have the music, the skill and the level now has grown from when I started."

But with challenges come tremendous rewards and according to the arranger, the best reward is winning Panorama. "I cannot ask for a better reward than that because we're going into the competition wanting to win and then that's exactly what we are doing, we're winning."

Uptown Fascinators' motto is Small band, large sound. "Whenever you hear this small band, we sound like a large band," Richards boasted. As for what to expect from this small band with a large sound, Richards insists, "More success and growing. Maybe one day we can jump up into the medium or large category...that is the future plan for the band, just to grow."

What does the arranger advise others who wish to be winners in the arena?

"Learn your theory. Music theory is very important. That plays a huge role in the success of Uptown Fascinators and me, as

an arranger," he explained.
"I started off arranging
without music theory. I
just did not really feel like
doing music theory, but
after restructuring how I
approach my arrangements,
I started scoring my music.
I'm able to see how the
music spreads, what is
clashing with what, and
what is not clashing. It is a
great asset."



"My grandmother (mother's mother) met Franklyn Jagdeo and Hott Stuff Promotions on Nikki on the Promenade and she insisted that I play mas with him and his band," explained Nagassar.

She played in the band as a masquerader till the age of 15 and in 2015, she was given the opportunity to play as an individual. That was the first year that Franklyn Jagdeo and Hott Stuff Promotions captured the Individual of the Year title.

From 2016, Nagassar was given the opportunity to play as a junior queen until the age of 18. In 2016 and 2017, she placed in the top ten in the finals and in 2018, she placed third.

She didn't play in 2019 because the band did not yet have a senior band. Due to covid19 and lockdowns, there was no Carnival in 2020 and 2021 but during the 2021-2022 period, Jagdeo decided to venture into a senior band and a great opportunity was once again given to Nagassar – she was asked to be a senior queen for the band.

"In 2022, the first year I played as a senior queen, I placed tenth in the finals," she said.

"This year, 2023, I placed eighth in the preliminary results and qualified for the semifinals. In the semifinals, I also placed 8th and qualified for the finals. In the finals oh well, I made history," she laughed.

While Nagassar always believed in herself, she never placed first in any competition.

"I started to think I was doing something wrong," she disclosed.

"So, I started doing things differently on stage. I always kept my smile while performing but I decided to do more, so, I began singing (making sure that they saw my lips moving) and using my hands to interact with the judges."

She started doing this in 2018 and placed third

"I thought to myself, "Well I am doing something right this time.

"For every performance, I try my best to be interactive towards the judges and before leaving the stage I blow kisses and give a wave to them," she smiled.

Nagassar's elaborate costume was designed by Jagdeo.

Asked how he feels about the win, Jagdeo said, "I was elated. This has always been a dream of mine since I was a child. It is definitely a dream come true. I enjoy my job and it gives me great pride and joy to see my design get into the finals on the big stage at the Queen's Park Savannah. It was pure joy for myself and my team which includes my father, Frankie, mother, Jenny, Erron Sookdeo, Navi Jagdeo, Sunil Jagdeo and Navin Matai. I thank God for this blessing and I am always grateful."

Questioned on the idea behind Nagassar's costume, Jagdeo, who has been designing for close to 24 years, explained, "Coming out of the pandemic and given the chance to design and produce the costumes, I felt like celebrating. I was in a celebratory mood and

what could be more fitting than a costume with the slogan, The Mother of All Carnival – Celebrations?"

Asked what went into the design of the costume, Jagdeo pointed out that he usually starts with the frame which he envisions and then discusses it with his father, since he constructs the frame.

"No sketches are done on paper," disclosed Jagdeo, "just my vision in my head."

The Mother of All Carnivals – Celebrations took about one week and two days to complete.

"A team of five, we worked night and day." Fabrics, braids, gemstones, foil, netting, feathers, steel, fibre glass, aluminium rods and PVC pipes were all used to create the masterpiece. Every aspect is discussed with his co-producers, Erron Sookdeo, Navi Jagdeo and Navin Matai.

Asked if he encountered any challenges with the piece, Jagdeo pointed out that his challenge is always with getting materials to go with his visions.

"I have a budget to work with because I am not a sponsored band so I always have to keep my spending in mind."

As for how he feels about working with Nagassar, Jagdeo said, "It is always a pleasure working with her. She is fun, so bubbly and she has a very happy, loving personality so designing for her comes easily."

While the bubbly Nagassar works as a clerical assistant trainee at councillor John Lezama's office in Caparo/Mamoral, rehearsals and fittings were of no issue for her as her boss supported her to the fullest. Rehearsals only happened once or twice before Carnival though and it was to try the costume to ensure she was comfortable.

Nagassar's family is also quite supportive of her involvement in the band.

"My family fully supports me," she pointed out. "If it was not for my family I wouldn't have been able to do this. They have been there from the very beginning and they continue to do so. My mom and dad are extremely proud of me as well as the other members of my family. I would definitely love to thank my grandmother (Nani, as I fondly call her) for getting me into Hott Stuff Promotions."

Asked if she had any words of advice for other queens, Nagassar said, "Always be confident. No matter what you place remember you are always a winner because not everyone can go on a stage and do what you do. It's a difficult thing to do, you feel anxious and you have a thousand things on your mind before entering the stage. But at the end of the day, not everyone can do the things we do. Go brave and success is sure to be yours."

So what does Nagassar plan to do with her winnings? She's in it for the love of it, she said.

"To be honest I do not even know how much is the prize, however, whatever it is, I will be giving it to my band leader, Franklyn Jagdeo for he is the one who did the design of the costume. It's his talent and his costume. I did not even have to pay to play and I will happily give the money to my band leader."

The young Nagassar lives by the motto – Do your best and the rewards will be granted. She explained that God answers prayers slowly but surely.

"You need to take one step at a time. Nothing happens before its timing."

As for her future plans, she disclosed, "I surely plan on defending my crown. I will be playing mas as long as I am able to. It's a part of me and who I am and nobody can change that."


THE BIRTH OF CARNIVAL

he canboulay (from the French cannes brulées, he canboulay (from the French cannes brulées, meaning burnt cane) festival is widely regarded as the precursor to the modern TT Carnival as we know it. It was originally a harvest festival, with singing, drumming, dancing and chanting.

The Canboulay riots took place in 1881 in Port of Spain and later in 1884 in San Fernando and Princes Town as a result of colonial police, led by Captain Baker, attempting to prevent Carnival celebrations from happening. Many people were killed as result of the riots.

The riots are re-enacted every year at the Piccadilly Greens in east Port of Spain to mark an important chapter in the history of the development of the country and its culture.
